



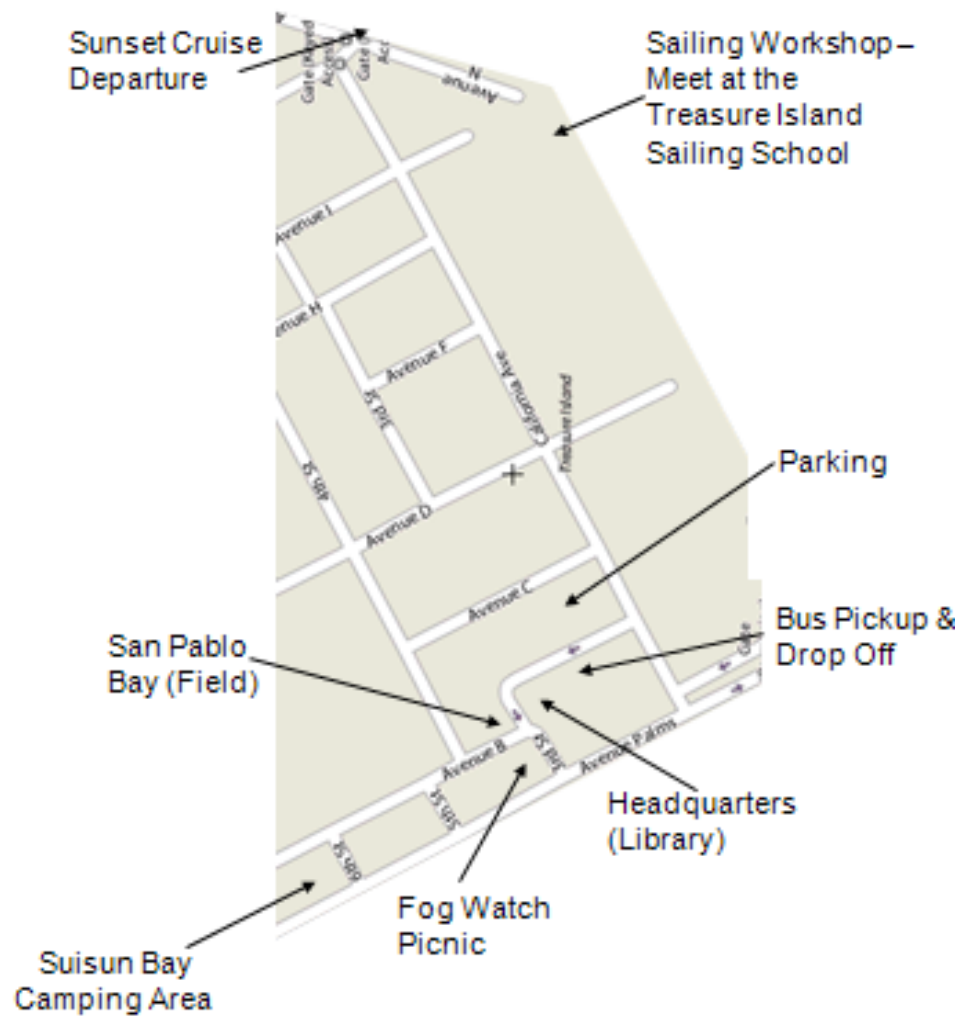

Fire Drill/ Emergency Procedures

- Alarm will signal (a series of three short blasts). All buildings and structures (tents) will be evacuated to the San Pablo Bay area (see map).
- Patrol Leaders will perform a headcount and report this headcount to the Host Patrol when requested.
- There will be an area identified for guests to check-in with a core staff member assigned to them.
- Host Patrol will report status of headcounts to Camp Headquarters.
- Campers will remain in evacuation meeting zone until dismissed.
- If girls are not present, master headcount list will be consulted to determine their whereabouts. If issues arise Camp HQ will be notified.
- Once the area is declared safe for re-occupancy, or drill is completed, an all clear signal will be sounded. This will be a single blast.

In the event of a disaster and the camp is told to evacuate by emergency personnel. All TI2008 participants will walk in an orderly fashion following the route as established by emergency personnel. Headquarters staff will keep Host Patrols updated, who in turn will share information with the campers as needed.

First Aid

First aid will be available on site at all times. Personnel will be available 8am - 10pm at the first aid station located at Camp HQ (Library). After hours a night nurse will be available in the volunteer area and her tent will be clearly marked. Bus Coordinators will be equipped with first aid kits for use during off sites.

Camp Rules

- Campers will carry with them at all times outside of their tents their camp provided identification and medical form.
- There will be no smoking or alcohol at the Camporee.
- Use the buddy system at all times.
- Quiet hours 10pm - 7am.
- Recycle! We have recycling dumpsters available.
- Remember, we have limited resources. Please be sure to use them wisely!
- Don't be late to catch your bus! They won't wait. Be sure to have your camp id, water bottle, lunch or lunch money and any other required items.
- Dress in layers! It can be cool in the mornings and evening and warm in the afternoons on the island. If you are going off site it will most likely be much warmer.

A Little Regional Information....

California

The state of California is the most populous state in the United States. Located on the Pacific coast of North America, it is bordered by Oregon, Nevada, and Arizona in the United States, and Baja California in Mexico. Its capital is Sacramento.

The state's four largest cities are Los Angeles, San Diego, San Jose, and San Francisco. California is known for its diverse climate and geography, and ethnically diverse population. California was admitted as the thirty-first state on September 9, 1850.

California is the third largest state by area in the U.S. The state's size gives it a diverse geography, which ranges from sandy and rocky beaches of the Pacific coast, to the rugged snow-capped Sierra Nevada Mountains in the east, to desert areas in the southeast and the forests of the northwest. The central portion of the state is dominated by the Central Valley, one of the most productive agricultural areas in the world. The Sierra Nevada contains Yosemite Valley, famous for its glacially-carved domes, and Sequoia National Park, home to the largest living organism on Earth, the giant sequoia trees, and the highest point in the contiguous United States, Mount Whitney. The tallest living things on Earth, the ancient redwood trees, dot the coast line, mainly north of San Francisco. California is also home to the second lowest and hottest place in the Western Hemisphere, Death Valley. Bristlecone pines located in the White Mountains are the oldest known trees in the world; one has an age of 4,700 years.

San Francisco

The City and County of San Francisco is the fourth most populous city of California and the fourteenth most populated in the United States.

In 1776, the Spanish settled the tip of the peninsula, establishing a fort at the Golden Gate and a mission named for Saint Francis of Assisi. The California Gold Rush in 1848 propelled the city into a period of rapid growth. After being devastated by the 1906 earthquake and fire, San Francisco was quickly rebuilt.

San Francisco is renowned for its steep rolling hills, an eclectic mix of Victorian and modern architecture, its diverse population, and its chilly summer fog and mild winters. Famous landmarks include the Golden Gate Bridge, Alcatraz Island, the cable cars, Coit Tower, and Chinatown.

Treasure Island

Treasure Island is a 404-acre man-made island, built originally for a municipal airport and later used for the 1939 Golden Gate International Exposition. Also included are 314 acres of submerged land. Yerba Buena Island, 350 acres of uplands and 243 acres of tide and submerged lands. The San Francisco-Oakland Bay Bridge bisects Yerba Buena.

The construction of Treasure Island began in February 1936 and was completed in January 1939. To build the 403 acre Island 29 million cubic yards of sand and gravel were transported to or dredged from the Bay and the Sacramento River delta. The name "Treasure Island" refers to the gold-laden fill dirt that washed down from the Sierras into the Bay, from which fill was dredged to create the island.

Later Treasure Island was primarily used as a naval training and administrative center. At its creation, Treasure Island was 14 feet above sea level. It is now 9 feet.
